

## **Garden Tips**

It is gardening time and for those who are gardening this year...get to it. Up here in the mountains we tend to not even start getting the garden ready til about now. For those down in the hot country, probably been gardening for the last month or so. We started a ton of stuff inside this year to get a jump on spring. The only problem with this is getting your plants used to the sun.

If you are like us and planted a ton of stuff indoors then you gonna need to take the time to acclimate them plants to the outside weather. Don't make the mistake of planting them straight from the house garden to the outdoors garden. Start putting them outside for a little while at a time. I suggest getting them close to the windows before you take them out. Then take them out for about an hour a day for a few days then increase the time gradually. I made the mistake the other day by leaving them out to long and the Broccoli bit the big one. The green beans seemed to burn on the one side so I also would recommend turning them as well so the sun hits both sides of the plant. Now I ain't no expert so you may even wane grab a book or check on the internet for proper acclimation of your plants. C.W.

# "Recipe of the month"

#### **Cattle Drive Cornbread**

4 cups cornmeal

1/2 cup vegetable oil

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 1/2 cups chopped onion

1 to 2 finely chopped jalapeño peppers

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

1 1/2 tablespoons salt

2 teaspoons black pepper

1 (16 ounce) can creamed corn

Boil a pan of water.

Mix cornmeal and vegetable oil well in a large bowl. Add just enough of the boiling water to form a dough that could be made into a ball. Add remaining ingredients except for the creamed corn. Mix to blend, then add creamed corn.

Coat the bottom of a cast iron skillet with vegetable oil. Heat over medium heat. Remove one cup of the cornbread mixture from the bowl, and add it to the skillet. Flatten out the cornbread, and cook as you would a pancake.

Editor note: I have made these and let me tell you......DELICIOUS!!!!!
